
A Robust Entrepreneurship Ecosystem

Greater Sudbury Development Corporation provided funding to the Regional Business Centre to assist in launching its Starter Company Plus Program which had 14 participants in 2017.






Funding Received from Municipal Innovation Fund (MIF)


The City of Greater Sudbury received funding from the Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration's (MCI) 2017 MIF. The City was awarded funding of \$45,000 over two fiscal years to develop a strategic approach and marketing strategy. The project is designed to support the attraction, integration settlement, and information needs of skilled Francophone immigrant talent, immigrant entrepreneurs and their families into the community.

Mayor Welcomes 130 Newcomers at Reception

GSDC partnered with two school boards and three post secondary institutions to host a number of events to welcome international students to Sudbury, which included the Mayor's Welcome Reception. Approximately 130 immigrant, refugee, and international students gathered at Science North to experience an Indigenous cultural exchange.



The Global Leader in the Mining Supply and Services Industry

Greater Sudbury delivered a compelling bid to host the proposed Noront Resources Ferrochrome Production Facility. The GSDC strengthened this bid by investing in logistics, transportation and environmental analysis of the Noront FPF proposal.

The construction of the ferrochrome production facility is proposed to begin within the next five to ten years at a cost of approximately \$1 billion.

The facility would create approximately 350 permanent jobs and about 150 indirect jobs within the community.

Exporting our Resources


The Export Marketing Assistance (EMA) Program, facilitated through the GSDC, has been helping small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) in Northern Ontario gain access to markets outside of Ontario including international markets. With a focus on engaging SMEs from the mining supply and services sector, the EMA program has served **53 local companies** through an **investment of \$300,000** which has leveraged total company spending of **\$766,000**. Companies have reported **short-term sales of \$5.4 million**. They have projected potential pipeline **sales of \$81 million** and the hiring of up to **118 new position**.

The City of Greater Sudbury prides itself on its diverse cultural heritage, thriving arts scene and vibrant talent in our community.

Stimulating the enhancement of our local arts and cultural sector has been a priority of the City of Greater Sudbury, the GSDC and its Board of Directors. In 2017, on behalf of City Council, the GSDC provided 36 grants to Arts & Culture organizations:








A Leader in Health and Life Sciences

The GSDC and the City of Greater Sudbury contributed \$1.75 million to the construction of Health Sciences North Research Institute's (HSNRI) new state-of-the-art facility. HSNRI is conducting life-saving research and attracting top researchers from around the world, who now call Sudbury home.

The GSDC also contributed \$120,000 to HSNRI to become home to a satellite facility for the Institute for Clinical Evaluative Sciences (ICES). The high-security research centre evaluates health care delivery and outcomes.

One of the Most Integrated Education and Innouation Ecosystems in Ontario

GSDC contributed funding to the Computer Engineering program at Collège Boréal to partner with Sudbury-based insurance broker Insurance Hero to create a chat robot that will automate the insurance quoting process using artificial intelligence. In partnership with Ontario Centres of Excellence, a two-year development process would be undertaken.

With support from GSDC, Cambrian College partnered with Laurentian University to test the effectiveness of bioleaching - extracting residual metals from mine tailings. The research is still being conducted and the innovative application is expected to serve as a benchmark for related industry research.

Place des Arts

A multidisciplinary, Francophone professional arts centre to be located downtown Sudbury. Construction is expected to begin in 2018 and will employ approximately 150 full-time temporary employees during construction and 10 jobs once in operation.



Regional Business Centre Starter Company Plus

A program funded through the Ontario government that provides training, mentoring and grant opportunities up to \$5,000 for eligible participants who are starting, expanding or buying a small business.

Major Events Development Officer

In 2016, this position was established to attract major events and conventions to Greater Sudbury. Since then, the City has built strong network connections, submitted multiple bid efforts and secured major events including Telus Cup and Esso Cup. As we look to the future with the City's Large Projects, these relationships will be of benefit as we attract larger conventions and events.

Centre for Excellence in Mining Innovation (CEMI)

Innovation and Prosperity Office

The investment was used to develop a project coordinator position at CEMI, through the Innovation and Prosperity Office (IPO), who supported small and medium sized-companies to innovate new technology or expand markets for their ideas. In total, they worked with 76 local companies and added 63 new jobs.




Underground Mine

NORCAT

Former Fecunis Mine in Onaping is now the site for a testing and training facility for underground technology in real world conditions. This is a unique training facility for North America and over 35 companies have used the site which shortens development cycle for revolutionary technology. Innovative local companies such as Hard-Line and Maestro Digital Mine use the mine to test and showcase products to international companies.

Greater Sudbury Chamber of Commerce

Transportation Logistics Opportunity Feasibility Study

Greater Sudbury is situated at the crossroads of multiple major road and rail transportation routes. Logistics and freight and bulk materials handling are critical components for current and prospective major employers. Given these two factors, the Greater Sudbury Chamber of Commerce assembled a committee of local companies to explore the potential for the attraction of a transportation and logistics facility in Greater Sudbury.



Project Transition

The intent of this project is to support the transition of Sudbury Area Mining Supply and Services Association (SAMSSA) from its current form into a fully developed, pan-Northern organization at the centre of our region's mining cluster. The goals are to expand and solidify membership and to develop specific programs that will benefit our mining supply and services companies. strengthening the cluster and sustaining jobs and economic activity in Greater Sudbury.



ICES Satellite Site

Through funding, HSNRI, NOSM, and Laurentian University constructed a high security health research centre in the HSNRI offices at HSN. This research centre functions as the northern satellite of the Institute for Clinical and Evaluative Sciences (ICES). ICES is a notfor-profit research organization, whose core function is to conduct research contributing to the effectiveness, guality, equity and efficiency of health care and health services in Ontario.
